Brunswick County April 26th 1806. Agreeably to an order of the Worshipful Court of Brunswick to us directed we have this day Audited, Stated & Settled the Acc^t the Bal^{ce} of an Acc^t current of George Atkins Adm^r of John Sumner dec^d as above & by having reference to the former Acc^t Current and an Acc^t returned to Court the 24th June 1802 we find there is a balance due the s^d Administrator of sixteen pounds fifteen Shillings and three pence which is to carry Int^l from this date until 1st June under our hands.

In the name of God amen I Thomas Manson being feeble in body but sound mind & understanding & reflecting on the uncertainty of all Sublunary things & human life in particular make & publish this my last will & Testament in manner form as follows that is to say I leave to my beloved wife Ann Manson during her natural life the following Negroes Charles Pickens & his son Ellen Sarah Solomon & their future Increase that her & the s^d Negroes reside between my six children Mary Barker Sampley Susannah Haraway Buford Martha Minson Edward Manson Agnes Pinette Manson & Thomas James Manson Also leave to my beloved wife the land & plantation that now live on Also I give the third part of my stock & household furniture I give & devise to my Daughter Mary Barker Sampley & her heirs forever the said Negroes Bob Amey Small & their increase I give & devise to my Daughter Susannah Haraway Buford & her heirs the following Negroes Manny Mully & Levina & their increase I give & devise to my Daughter Martha Minson & her heirs the following Negroes Bob Mettles & Eliza Minson

increase I give & devise to my son Edward Manson his heirs the said negroes Cesar
 Striboy & Allen & their increase. I give & devise to my Daughter Agnes Thurstall
 Manson his heirs the said negroes Major, Easter, Billy & their increase
 I give & devise to my son Thomas James Manson his heirs the following Negroes
 Jack, Toby & Patt & their increase And the tract of land that I now live on at
 my wife's Death I give & devise to my son Thomas James Manson I give & devise
 to my son Edward Manson the tract of land I bought of Henry Keatts & Co. Except
 one third part of the said mill & land to my wife Ann Manson & after her death
 to my son Edward Manson I also give to my Daughters that is now unmarried
 that when married or come to age a good Horse about \$500 & a lot of furniture two cows
 & calves to be raised out of my Estate not before mentioned And at my wife's death
 all my Estate not before mentioned both real and personal to be equally divided between
 my six children above mentioned also I appoint Edward & James Tarpley & Abraham Buford
 my Executors to this my last will & testament in testimony whereunto set my hand &
 seal this nineteenth day of October Eighteen hundred & five—
