of Brunswick (State of Virginia) being at present weak in body but sound in mind thanks
be to almighty God for his blessings do appoint and ordain this to be my last will &
testament in manner following (to wit) I do hereby give, devise and bequeath that two
hundred acres of my lands be sold for the payment of my just debts & of any part
of my lands that my executor hereafter to be named shall think proper I give
and bequeath to my loving wife Sarah Atkinson one negro man named Morgan & one
Negro woman named Sney and her increase during her natural life and at her death
my will & desire is that the said Morgan & Sney and her increase be equally divided
between my dear youngest children vizt. Maria Atkinson, Frances Atkinson, James
Atkinson & Susanna Betty Atkinson to them & their heirs forever I then give and
bequeath to my son William Atkinson five shillings good & lawful money of Virginia to him &
his heirs forever I then give and bequeath to my daughter Polly Atkinson five shillings
good and lawful money of Virginia to her and her heirs forever I then give and bequeath
to my son in law John's brother and his four children each five shillings vizt. Polly children
of my daughter Polly better now dead, five shillings each good & lawful money of Virginia
to them and their heirs forever I then give and bequeath to my daughter Susanna
Williamson Atkinson five shillings good & lawful money of Virginia to her and her heirs forever
I then give and bequeath to my son John Atkinson five shillings good and lawful
money of Virginia to him and his heirs forever I then give and bequeath to my daughter
Rebecca Copper Chambliss five shillings to her and her heirs forever I then give and
bequeath to my daughter Mary Atkinson one negro woman named Nancy to her &
her heirs forever I then give and bequeath to my daughter Frances Atkinson one
Negro boy named Jack to her and her heirs forever I then give and bequeath to my
son James Atkinson one negro named Ed to him & his heirs forever I then give and
bequeath to my daughter Susanna Betty Atkinson one negro named Pick to her &
her heirs forever I then I leave to my loving wife Sarah Atkinson all the remainder
of my land which about my will should be sold her life of widowhood and at her death
or marriage I then give to my son James Atkinson all the remainder of my lands
except the two hundred acres of land heretofore left to be sold I then I leave to my
loving wife Sarah Atkinson all the remainder of my estate not above given in legacies
of every kind whatsoever during the life of her widowhood and at her death or marriage
my will & desire is that all the said remainder of my estate not above given in legacies
shall be equally divided between Mary Atkinson, Frances Atkinson, James Atkinson
and Susanna Betty Atkinson or the surviving number of them to them and their heirs
forever And lastly I do authorize my appointed my son John Atkinson and Thomas
Parker my whole & sole executor of this my last will & testament In witness whereof
