In the Name of God Amen I Henry Britt of

Brunswick County Virginia Wills
1765-1769
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Brunswick County in Meherin Parish calling to mind
the Mortality of Human Nature and being now weak in
Body but in perfect Mind and disposing Memory so make
and ordain this my last Will and Testament in form and
manner following

I Item I give unto Henry Britt the son of my Brother John
Britt one Negro Woman named Rose to him his Heirs and
Assigns forever.

I also give to John Britt son of my Brother John Britt all my
wearing Apparel

I also give to Henry Disbatter the son of my Wife Eoy that Part of
my Land lying the upper side of the Branch that runs next
to my Plantation I also give to the said Henry Disbatter after
his Mothers decease the Plantation whereon I now live and

to my plantation I also give to the said Henry Sedbetter after
his Mothers decease the Plantation whereon I now live and
one Negro Boy named Tom to him his Heirs and assigns
for ever. I also give to Charles Sedbetter the son of my Wife
Evy one hundred Acres of Land I bought of George Sims be the
same more or less to him his Heirs and assigns for ever.
I also desire all my Just Debts to be paid out of my Estate
I also give to my Wife Evy the use of one Negro Boy named
Tom during her life and the use of the Plantation whereon
I now live during her life I also give to my Wife Evy after
my just Debts is paid all my Other Estate of Negroes Stock
Household Goods &c. to her and to her disposing further in my
Will and desire is that my Estate may not be brought to an
appraisement and I do hereby appoint my Wife Evy Brill
and her Son Henry Sedbetter Executors of this my last Will
and Testament hereby revoking and annulling all

By one hundred Acres of Land I bought of George Sims be the
same more or less to him his Heirs and assigns for ever
I also desire all my Just Debts to be paid out of my Estate
I also give to my Wife By the use of one Negro Boy named
Tom during her life and the use of the Plantation whereon
I now live during her life I also give to my Wife By after
my just Debts is paid all my Other Estate of Negroes Stock
Household Goods &c. to her and to her disposing further in my
Will and desire is that my Estate may not be brought to an
Appraisement and I do hereby appoint my Wife By Bill
and her Son Henry Leebetter Executors of this my last Will
and Testament hereby revoking and annulling all
Wills made by me heretofore In Witness to which I have
hereunto set my Hand and affixed my Seal this twenty
Sixth Day of May in the Year of our Lord one thousand

seven hundred and sixty five
