almighty God have given it me and I am assured after all my

Debt is paid that the rest of my Estate shall be divided as follows

First it is my desire that my beloved Daughter Mary Smith
have the house and land that she has now in possession and a two

Year old negro and all the Land above Cold Water Run her life

and after her death to her son James Smith and after his death it my

desire that if my Daughter Mary Smith have another son he call

his name Richard and he to enjoy the Land I Will Give to my son

William Huggins one Moore and Gott and one Gunn and sword and

it is my desire that my two sons William and John have all the rest

of my Land and to be equally divided between them after their

Mothers decease and I desire my son William should have the lower

part of the Land and to take it in possession when he comes to

Lawfull age not interrupting his Mother nor disturbing her in

the least and it is my desire that my Daughter Fortune one Shilling
Item I give to my Daughter Martha one Shilling and it is my
desire my two sons William and John shall have all my Personal
Estate after their Mother's death and after she is married to be
Equally divided between them as **Witness** my hand this 14th
day of August 1742

The within Last will and Testament of William Huggins deceased was
presented in Court by Mary Huggins his widow and proved by the
oath of John Brande one of the referees thereto and ordered to be
Recorded And on the motion of the said Mary Certificate is granted
her for obtaining Letters of Adminⁿ of the Estate of the said deceased with
his will annexed in due form.
