Buriall at the Discretion of my Executors hereafter mentioned
Nothing doubting but to Receive the same at the General Resurrection
by the strength of power of God. and as for the Estate wherewith it hath
pleased our mighty God to bless me within this life I Dispose of it in
the following manner. I Myself give and bequeath unto
my eldest son Wade one city of Land containing two Acres and
seventy nine in Dockeys Creek in the County of Lunenburg to
him his Heirs and Assigns forever. I Myself give and bequeath
unto my son Simon one certain tract of Land in the Plantation
thence containing two Acres and seventy nine in

the following manner. I Give and Bequeath unto
my Eldest Son Wade one city of Land containing six Acres and
several in Dockage Creek in the County of Lunenburg to
him his Heirs and Assigns forever. I Give and Bequeath
unto my son Timothy one certain tract of Land with a plantation
thereon containing five Acres and thirty Nine Lying in
the said County of Lunenburg his Heirs and Assigns forever.
I Give and Bequeath unto my said son Timothy one
certain piece of Land in the same more or less being part
of the said of Wade. I Give and Bequeath unto my son William
one hundred Acres of Land in the said County of Lunenburg
to him his Heirs and Assigns forever.

25th. Continued Thomas's letter of the 17th. The remainder was typical of
 this and his signature. NEM I give the money that remaining
 three hundred acres of land with my plantation when and now
 live with my loving wife during my natural life and after my death
 the said land and plantation to be sold by way of public auction
 to the highest bidder and the money arising therefrom I give
 and bequeath unto my two daughters Mary Spideman and
 Lucy & with to be equally divided between them. NEM I give and
 bequeath unto my said son Timothy my old broad bag and known
 for the name of a Carpenter and so on one inch square one three quarters
 square one half inch square two Cairns one piece of timber two hundred
 pounds, one pound and drawing and also a parcel of bones and a
 few skins and a sign of mine. NEM I give and bequeath unto my
 son Wade one half inch and three quarters square one skin and a
 piece. NEM I give and bequeath unto my said son James one
 one young black horse now in his possession and by him and
 one warren like one skin and a sign of mine. My Will and Test
 is that one of these shall be my last and true last will and testament
