 Goods it hath pleased God to Bestow on me I give and Bequeath as followeth Item.

 furniture and one Chest Item. I Do Give to My Son Robert Bailey five Shillings
 Current Money Item. do Give to my Daughter faith James five Shillings Current
 Money Item. do Give to my Son William Bailey five Shillings Current Money
 Item. do Give to My Son in Law Benjamin Pennington By his giving My
 Daughter Elisabeth Bailey one pound Ten Shillings Current Money
 Yearly During the Life of the fellow one Negroe Man named Jamey and
 the Remainder Part of my Estate Household Goods and Chattels I do Give
 and Bequeath to My Son in Law Benjamin Pennington Whome I do
 Leave My whole and Sole Executor October ye 13th Day 1769.

thereto and ordered to be Recorded and Certificate granted the Said
Executor for obtaining a probate thereof in due form he having with
James Pennington his Security entered into an acknowledged Bond
in the penalty of Five hundred pounds with condition according
to Law.
