To my daughter Sizzie H. Putney the bed upon which I usually sleep, one half the feathers out of my lightest bed, one set of china, one set lace curtains and rods, one silver cake basket, and all my pictures.

To my son James B. Woodfin my horse and harness, steers & cart, one cottage bedstead including feather bed, bolster, pillows & covering, and one half of all crops now growing or that may grow on my Down for the year 1889.

To my daughter Maurice E. Woodfin in consideration of her not having had an equal opportunity with the older children five hundred dollars to be paid out of my interest in my father's estate, two cows, two heifers, one black walnut bedstead, one feather bed, bolster & pillows & mattress, one light colored packing trunk & contents, Parlor & Chamber furniture & Text Books.

I give bequith and devise all the rest, residue and remainder of my real and personal estate to my children or their heirs who may be living at the time of my decease to be divided equally between them.

Putney to be executor of this my last will and testament, without security
hereby revoking all former wills by me,
