this my last Will and Testament as follows. I leave to my wife Elizabeth
Westbrook my whole estate real and personal during her life or widow-
hood and after her death or marriage, I desire the whole of such estate
so long as she be sole or such Credit as my executors may judge best, and
the money arising therefrom after paying all my just debts, be equally
divided betwixt my Children following, that is to say Elizabeth, Elijah,
Elisha, Sally and John Westbrook's, and should any of the above named
Children die before they receive their parts leaving no Issue, I desire the
same shall be divided amongst the survivors or their legal representatives
if of such Issue then to such Issue. I leave Josiah Westbrook (my son)
and Benjamin Davis (my son in law) my executors who I request will
attend to my estate and prevent any unnecessary waste of my lands.
