and personal during her natural life or widowhood. 2nd I desire and
direct that my Childrens Viz, Peggy Rawlins, Polly Rawlins, William Rawlins,
John Rawlins, Nancy Rawlins, and Lucretia Rawlins, be maintained and
educated out of my estate until they marry or come of age. 3rd I give to my
two sons William Rawlins and John Rawlins after the death of my beloved wife
all my Land estate to them and their heirs forever to be equally divided between
them. 4th I desire that all my Personal estate be equally divided after my
beloved wifes death between all my Childrens Viz, Sally Larner, Letty Bullock,
Peggy Rawlins, Polly Rawlins, William Rawlins, John Rawlins, Nancy Rawlins,
and Lucretia Rawlins except two feather beds which I give to my daughters Peggy
Rawlins and Polly Rawlins. 5th and Lastly I appoint my friends Langston
Dixon, David W. Cargo, and Edward Almond executors to this my last Will and

This last Will and Testament of John Rawlings dec^d was presented in Court to

Robert W. Bargo, John W. Bargo, and William Milons the three witnesses thereto
subscribed as well as the Testimony of the said Edward Almond, Ordered
