

In the Name of God Amen I, James Richardson of Charlotte
County living in Health and of Disposing mind and memory do make and
ordain this my last Will and Testament. In premis. Lasta what worldly
Estate it hath pleased God to bestow ^{on me} in this life I give and Dispose of
in manner and form following Viz. I leave I leave to my Daughter Martha
Dawson one negro woman named ~~Stoney~~ ^{Stoney}. During her natural life, and after her
Death, I give the said Negro to be equally Divided among her Children. Then I give
to my Daughter Fanny Jackson one large ^{red} leather trunk to her and her heirs
forever. Then I give to my Daughter Agnes Vaughten my side Saddle. —
Then I give to my Grand Daughter Martha Sumpter, one feather bed
stead and furniture and one chair to her I leave her forever. Then I give
the remainder of my Estate to my five Children Viz. John Richardson
Anne Fanny Agnes Vaughten, Sumner Jackson and Fanny Jackson
to them and their heirs forever to be equally Divided amongst them, and
to be sold out of my family I constitute my son John Richardson
and son in Law Lewis Jackson Executors of this my last Will and
Testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 11th

second day of January one thousand seven hundred and eighty eight
signed and sealed in presence of O. Claybrook } Henry Richardson L.S.
Robert Vernon, Sarah Claybrook }

at a Court held for Charlotte County the 3rd day of October 1791.

This last Will and Testament of Henry Richardson dec^d was exhibited
in Court by Lewis Jackson one of the Executors here named (John Richardson
the other Executor being dead) and the same was proved by the oath of
Abner Claybrook and Robert Vernon and ordered to be Recorded, on the
motion of said Executor Lewis Jackson who made oath according to
Law to attest & granted him for obtaining a probate of the said Will
in due form & giving Security whereupon he and Thomas Ephraim
his security interposed and acknowledged their hands for that purpose.
