Court do therefore find & condemn the said Wood to pay the penalty
sum of ten thousand pounds of tobacco of tobacco as aforesaid
amounting to the said law to be disposed by one of the Judges of the Court
directly & that the said tobacco remain in the Court's custody until
he have given caution for the same.
