I Ann Finch of Charles City County, being sick and weak in Body, but of perfect mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following, W^{it} Item. After my Just debts are paid I give and bequeath to my son Collin Finch one Negro Girl named Phoebe and her increase if any; one Bed and furniture one Horse and Saddle and one Dress to him and his lawful Heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath to my four Daughters i.e. Mary Treeman, Patsy Amos, Francis Johnston and Elizabeth M. Finch one Negro Man John, one Negro Woman named Sabra, one Negro Boy named Ivin & the brop of born, Wheat &c on hand, for their use and benefit; to be equally divided between them, to them, and their lawful Heirs and assigns forever. Item I further give and bequeath to my Daughter Elizabeth M. Finch, one feather Bed and furniture the first choice, the Gigg and Stairs one grey filly and one Drapery table & the flap thereof unto belonging, to her and the lawful Heirs of her body forever. Item I give and bequeath to my grand Daughter Nancy Treeman one red and white bow, purchased at Mrs. Finchs sale, to her. Item I further give, to be equally divided between my four Daughters, above mentioned; the whole of the rest of my property consisting of half a Dozen Windsor chairs, drapery draws one bay mare &c to them and their heirs forever. Lastly I leave my Brother John Bradley, John Oppes, Thomas Johnston and William Amos executors of this my last will and testament, revoking and making void all other wills heretofore made by me, and confirming this to be my last. The aforesaid last will and testament of Ann Finch deceased was this day presented in Court by John Oppes one of the executors therein named, and being proved by John Winford Michael S. Bradley and James Bhandler three of the Witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded - And on the motion of the said executor ^{who} made oath as the law directs and entered into bond with John Bradley his security in the penalty of twelve thousand Dollars conditioned according to law, Certificate is granted him for obtaining a probat thereof in due form - liberty reserved the other executors therein to join in the probat when they may think fit.
