Henry Southalls
Will

In the name of God amen I Henry Southalls of Charles City County being weak in body but of sound mind memory and understanding the gathering to mind the uncertainty of this life and that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and devise this my last will and Testament in manner and form following. First of all I recommend my soul into the hands of almighty God who gave it me and my body to be buried in a Christian like manner by my Executors hereafter mentioned, and as to what worldly estate it has been pleased to bless me with I give and bequeath and form following. — Impionis. Item I give and bequeath unto my son John Southalls all my Lands both in Charles City and New Kent Counties after giving his Mother a genteel support, to him and his heirs forever. — Item I give and bequeath all my Slaves in the following manner that is to say to my son John Southalls the one half, and the other half be equally divided between my three grand children, to wit, Henry Stott, Sarah R. Stott, and John S. Stott the following Slaves to be put into the parts of my three grand Children above mentioned that is to say Rippin, Grace, Philis, Fanny, Nanny, Bob, Anster, Ariana and Samistead and all their future increase the part ~~of~~ my slave given to my son John Southalls I give to him and his heirs forever. My will and desire is that if either of my grand Children should die before they come to lawful age, or married, that the part given them be equally divided between the survivors or survivor of them, but if the whole of them should die before they come of lawful age or marries then my express will and desire is that all the above slaves before given to them I give and bequeath unto my son John Southalls to him and his heirs for and further my will and desire is that my son John Southalls should have the whole and sole management of the slave I have given unto my three grand Children until they come to lawful age or marries. — Having not as yet pointed out any part of slaves to my loving wife Elizabeth Southalls my express will and desire is that she shall have and enjoy during her natural life the following slaves to wit; Emanuel, Sarah and any Girl belonging to my Estate she may make choice of. — Item I give unto my three grand Children before mentioned all the plate and furniture I lent their father Williams Stott to them and their

 and John Taylor and William Southall and Richmond Allen my Executors of this
 my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other will heretofore made by me.

In the name of God amen I Ann Gilliam of the County of Charles
 City being sick and weak in body but of perfect sense and memory thanks be
 given to God, calling to mind the mortality of my body, knowing that it is appointed
 for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, that
 is to say. Principally and first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of almighty
 God that gave it, and my body to the earth, to be buried in Christian decent burial
 at the discretion of my Executors of my friends, And for such worldly estate
 as it has pleased God to bless me with I give demise and dispose of in the following
 manner and form. I give and bequeath to my brother Jeffery Gilliam daughter
 Elizabeth ^{Gilliam} one feather Bed and furniture, also I give and bequeath to my sister in law
 Sarah Gilliam ten pounds. also I give and bequeath to my brother Jeffery Gilliam
 one negro man named Bob, and should his wife out live him, I give the afore-
 said Negro man to her during life, and if the said Negro man Bob should out
 live Jeffery Gilliam and his wife, my desire is that the said Negro man be hired
 out yearly and the money equally divided among the children of my brother Jeffery.
 Also I give and bequeath to my brother Jeffery Gilliam all the residue of my
 estate of every kind whatsoever at my decease. I do hereby constitute my brother
 Jeffery sole Executor of this my last will and Testament, satisfying ^{confirming} this and no other
