

I John Bonford of Charles City County being in perfect sense, mind, and memory, and calling to mind the uncertainty of this life, do make and ordain my last will and Testament, revoking and disannulling all former will and Testaments heretofore made by me. — I give & bequeath to my two eldest sons Robert and Thomas Bonford my tract of land on Chickahominy Swamp containing by estimation one hundred and fifty acres to be equally divided between them, after the death of my loving wife, to them and their heirs, and assigns forever. — Item. I give to my son Thomas Bonford one feather Bed and furniture, one cow and calf, and one sow and Pigs to him and his heirs forever. — Item. I give and bequeath to my son John Bonford thy Land and plantation wherow I now dwell, and the plantation called Days after the death of my loving wife (only my desire is that my daughter Martha may have half the house, and as much land as she can cultivate where she may chuse, as long as she remains single) also one feather Bed and furniture, one cow and calf, and one sow and Pigs to him and his heirs forever. — Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter Martha Bonford one feather Bed and furniture, one cow & Calf, and one sow and Pigs to her and her heirs and assigns forever. — Item. My will and desire is that my four negroes David, Mozy, Jacob, and Kate may have their Freedom, and be intitled to all the estate they may hereafter acquire. — Item. I lend to my loving wife all the remainder and residue of my estate during her natural life, and after her decease, my will and desire is that my estate so left may be divided in manner following, to wit, that my <sup>three</sup> sons Robert, Thomas and John Bonford may have a share each, and my two daughters Mary Brown and Martha Bonford two shares each of the said estate to them and their heirs forever. — Lastly I constitute and appoint my brother James Bonford, and Gerrard Ellison my whole and sole Executors of this my last will and Testament. In Witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and affixed my seal this twentieth day of the second month, one thousand seven hundred and eighty.

At a monthly Court held for Charles City County on Thursday the nineteenth day of February 1795; The aforeswitten last Will and Testament of John Bonford deceased was this day proved by James Ladd, and Charles McHenry two of the witnesses thereto, and ordered to be recorded. And the Executors therein named refused to qualify, and on the motion of Thomas Bonford and making affirmation thereto as the law directs, and together with James Ladd and John Bonford his securities entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of two hundred pounds, with condition according to Law, certificate is granted him for obtaining Letters of administration with the said Will annexed in due form.

Will

In the name of God amen I David Wilkinson of the County of Charles City being very weak in body but in perfect mind & memory do make, and ordain, constitute, and appoint this my last Will and Testament in manner following — In nomine. My desire is that my two Negro men one by the name of Sampson, the other by the name of Daniel should have their freedom, and not serve in slavery to no person after my death; I desire also that my Land whereon I now live containing one hundred and sixty acres, lying and bordering on the south side of Chickahoonony Swamp shall after my death be publicly sold by my Executors, and the money divided equally among my two sisters to wit, Rebecca Hamlett and Martha Clarke to them and the heirs of their bodies forever, and my desire is that my maid to wit, Polly Wilkinson daughter of Richard Wilkinson shall have an equal part with the above mentioned heirs; And I desire also that all my stock, household and kitchen furniture, and all the remainder of my estate shall be sold in the manner above mentioned, and the money equally divided among the heirs above mentioned — My desire is that my estate should not be appraised — Lastly I appoint and constitute Richmond Perrall and James Bradley Executors of this my last Will and Testament to see the same justly performed. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and seal this second day of September in the year of our Lord one Thousand seven hundred & eighty five —

# In the name of God Amen

I Gideon Christian of the County of Charles City, being in an unfirm state  
of health, and considering the uncertainty of human life do make and ordain  
this my last will and Testament in following manner and form. —

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Eaton Christian part of my tract of land  
known by the name of Collinses, bounded thus, beginning on little Stories run  
near where Sally Adams lives and running along a line of new marked trees to  
Collinses run, all the land lying on the west side of said line, and one negro  
boy named Bristo, to him and his heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath  
unto my son Francis Christian the remainder of my tract of land known by  
the name of Collinses being all the land lying on the east side of the line  
mentioned above; and one negro boy named Peter, to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Patrick Christian part of the  
tract of land whereon I now live bounded as follows, to wit, beginning at Moores  
Aland on Chickahominy River, and running from thence towards the south  
along a line of marked Trees to a large Mulberry-tree that's marked, and  
stands in the edge of an old Field, from thence running a westerly course along  
a line of marked Trees under the hill, to a dogwood standing by the side of an  
old ditch, from thence running up the hill towards the south, along a marked  
line to a red oak standing in the head of the bottom or Valley which lies  
fronting my dwelling House between the plantations from thence down the said  
bottom, or Valley to Stories Run, so down the run to Chickahominy River, and  
thence up the River to the beginning of the said line; containing two hundred  
and fifty acres, more or less; and one negro boy named Harry to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son William Allen Christian the remainder  
part of the tract of land whereon I now live, containing two hundred & eighty  
acres more or less; and one negro boy marked Ned to him and his heirs forever. —
