before he arrives to the age of Twenty one years, in that case I give the  
said Land to my daughter, Sally Perry, to her, and her Heirs, forever, law-  
fully begotten.

Item. My will, and desire is, that all the residue of my estate whatsoever  
be equally divided between my daughters Priscilla Perry, Lucy Perry, &  
Sally Perry, to them, and their Heirs, <sup>future</sup>, lawfully begotten, but, if it should  
be the case, that my son William should die, before he arrives to the age  
of Twenty-one years, and my daughter Sally should be alive, to her the  
Land, my will and desire is, that she should not come in for any  
part of my estate, given to my three daughters, but that it should  
be equally divided between my other two daughters Priscilla & Lucy.  
Lastly I constitute and appoint William Southall my whole, and sole  
Executor. —

I David Merry, of Charles city County, being in perfect sense, and memory, thank be unto almighty God for the same, do constitute, and ordain this my last will, and Testament, in manner, and form following. — First, I recommend my soul into the hands of almighty God, humbly beseeching him, to be merciful to me at the hour of death, and day of Judgment, and my body, to the earth to be buried by the directions of my Executors, hereafter named, and touching my worldly estate, I give and dispose of, in manner and form following, to wit. Item. — I give and bequeath, unto my son in law William Hemp, Forty Acres of Land, part of the clared land and part of the wood land, lowground, for the term of Eight years next ensuing bounded, these beginning on St. Vaiden's line, and Including the House now raised for the said Hemp, or as to form it nearly square. Also if the said William Hemp will build a Mill, 22 feet long, 24 feet wide, two stories high, of Brick work, over shot, with double gear running work, with two pair of Stones, in the course a term of three years from this date, that he shall have one half of the profits thereof, for the term of seven years, after her first going to work. Item. I give and bequeath unto my living wife Elizabeth Merry all the rest of my Land, and Plantation, wherein I now live, during her natural life, and all the root, and residue of my estate, real, or personal, during her natural life, to assist in bring up, and educating my young children, and if she should depart this life before my youngest surviving child, arrives to the age of fourteen years,

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it my desire that the profits of my said estate should be for the supporting, and maintaining of my youngest child, until that youngest surviving child, shall arrive to the age of fourteen years, and then to be equally divided if my wife should be dead, but if she should be living, no division to take place until her death, and then my estate both real, and personal, to be equally divided between all my children, and Anna Fodder Chandler, I mean the said Chandler to have an equal part with my children, to wit, Isaac Hump, John Harry, Elizabeth Maynard, Susanna Avery, Rebecca Avery, David Avery, Ramsey Avery, Thomas Avery, and George Avery, to them their heirs forever. — And lastly I do nominate and appoint my loving wife Eliza Avery, and John Avery, my son, the whole and sole Executors, of this my last will and Testament, revoking and disannulling all other Wills heretofore made by me. In witness whereof I do set my hand, and fix my seal this 22<sup>nd</sup> day of February 1793. —
