

Richardson Wal-
ker's Will

In the name of God amen I Richardson Walker of
the County of Charles City & Parish of Westover being sick and weak
of body, but of perfect mind and memory, do make and ordain
this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, to wit,
Item I give to my four Slaves Abigail and her three daughters named
Lilly, Tabitha, and Abigail their freedom after my death, the aforesaid
Abigail and three daughters are to be at their Liberty to act & do for
themselves as any other free people of the state. Item I give to the
aforesaid Abigail and her three daughters Lilly, Tabitha & Abigail
my whole estate. It is my will and desire that my Estate may
be kept together by my Executors hereafter mentioned in order that
Abigail and her three daughters may equally be supported out of the
profits of the estate devised to them. My will and desire is that my
Executors get some place such as they shall think proper for Abigail
and her children to reside on, and that they may all live together.

desire that when any of the aforesaid should die that the Estate
still shall stand equally divided among those who survive to
them and their heirs forever. I constitute and appoint Benjamin
McWilliams, Poling Locke my friends Executors to this my Last Will
and Testament. In Witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand
and seal, this twenty second day of September, One Thousand seven
hundred and ninety three.
