In the name of God AMEN I Thomas Spaggins of the County of Charles City, being sick and weak of body, but of sound & perfect mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following. My soul I recommend to almighty God who gave it me hoping through the merit and intercession of my blessed Saviour Jesus Christ to obtain a pardon for all my offences towards God and man, my body to be committed to the earth, and decently interred at the directions of my Executors hereafter mentioned, and as to the worldly Estate it has pleased God to bless me with, I give and bequeath in manner, and form following. — Imprimis, I give and bequeath to my loving wife my Estate of what degree or dignity soever for and during the term

of her natural life, and after her death to be equally divided among my surviving children, excepting my daughter Ann Austin, as also reserving my Lands which I give to my son William — Item I give and bequeath unto my son William at the death of my loving wife Elizabeth all my Land, to him and his heirs forever — Item I give and bequeath unto my daughter Ann Austin one boar and half to her and her heirs forever. — Lastly I do hereby appoint my loving wife Elizabeth Spraggins, my brother W<sup>t</sup>. Spraggins and my friend John Lamb Executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all other wills by me heretofore made. At a monthly court held for Charles City County on Thursday the fifteenth day of January 1795: The afore written last Will and Testament of Thomas Spraggins was proved by the oath of Henry Armistead one of the witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. And William Spraggins and John Lamb two of the executors thereon named being dead, and Mrs Spraggins the Executrix relinquished her right therof in favour of Robt Goodrich, And on the motion of the said Goodrich who made oath thereto according to Law, and he together with Miles Cary and John Ballard his security entered into and acknowledge their bond in the penalty of one thousand pounds with such condition as the law directs, Certificate is granted him for obtaining letters of administration with the said Will annexed in due form.
