Douglass and Charles Word the witnesses thereto is ordered to be recorded, and on the motion of the said Executor, who made oath as the Law directs, and entered into bond with John Christian & John Hunt Christian his securities in the sum of seven thousand Dollars, conditioned according to Law, Certificate is granted him for obtaining a probat thereof in due form, liberty reserved the other Executors therein named to join in the Probat, when they may think fit.

I Thomas Griffiths of Charles City County, and parish of Westmore being very sick and weak, but of perfect sense and memory, and tranquillity of mind, do constitute and ordain this my last Will and testament in private. Knowing it is appointed One for all men to die, trusting in my dear Redeemer, I resign my soul to Him who gave it being, and my Body unto the Earth, from whence it was taken, in shame and certain hope of joyful Resurrection, and a blessed immortality, and as for my worldly goods, which God has graciously lent me, I give and bequeath them as followeth. In private, First my will and desire is that all my just debts be paid, and after they are paid, my will and desire is to lend the use of my whole estate, both real and personal to my beloved wife Amey Griffiths, during of her natural life. Then my will and desire is that after my beloved wife's death that my lands, the whole of it may be divided between my two Sons, namely William Griffiths, and John Griffiths, my will and desire is that after the death of my beloved wife that all my Negro slaves that may be alive at that time be divided among my Children by selling them out on Lots, and not to be sold among my Children namely William Griffiths, John Griffiths, Martha Trapwell the wife of Jacob Trapwell, Amey Griffiths, Mary Griffiths, Elizabeth, Nancy Griffiths

Katharine Griffith, and that the remainder of my personal Estate be sold  
and the money equally dividing amongst my above-mentioned children. Item my will  
and desire is that if my Daughter Martha Chapman, should die without having of  
any Child, then that her part of my estate that fell to her to return to be divided  
amongst her Brothers and Sisters that is named above, and lastly I appoint  
my beloved wife Mary Griffith my Executrix with my trusty friend Edward  
Merrable my Executor of this my last will and Testament. Whom I have  
herunto set my hand and seal this twenty ninth day of November in the  
year of our Leds One thousand seven hundred and eighty nine.
