In the name of God Amen. I William Charles senior of Rehoboth City of sound mind and memory, do constitute and appoint, this my last Will and Testament in manner and form as follows: That

First I recommend my Soul to God that gave it and my body to be buried in a Christian like manner, by my friends, then I proceed to dispose of my worldly goods, as it has pleased God to bestow upon me.

Item My will and desire is that all my Just debts be first paid. Item I leave unto my loving Wife Sarah Charles, all the Land I now am in possession of with my Old Mare known by the name of Locket, four cows, two Kittellings, two Sows & pigs, Ten Sheeps, Three Beds and other Household furniture, which she shall think necessary for her use during her life, and at her death the Three Beds to be divided as follows to wit: The Bed I usually lay on I give to my daughter Sarah Vaughan Roberts, the Bed called by the name of the Girls Bed I give to my Daughter Polly Charles, the other Bed I give to my Granddaughter Martha Charles, daughter of John Charles, to them and their heirs forever. My Will and desire that what I have given to my children before the making of this Will they shall possess quietly they and their heirs for ever. Item I give unto my Grandson Polling Charles son of John Charles, after the death of his Grandmother all my Land lying on the Southside of the Road leading from Edlows Ferry to the Courthouse, adjoining the Land of William Southall and the Land belonging the Estate of Hubbard together, I likewise give unto the said Polling one Cow & half to him and his heirs for ever. But I first lend the said Land to John Charles during his natural Life, and after his death if it should so happen I lend the said Land to his wife Mary Charles during her Widowhood, but if the said Mary Charles should marry, my Will and desire is that the aforesaid Land should be rented out for the benefit of the said Polling Charles. Item I leave unto my daughter Sarah Vaughan Roberts after the death of her Mother all my Land on the North side of the Road leading from Edlows Ferry to the Courthouse, containing forty one & half Acres, and at the death of my daughter Sarah V. Roberts, I give the said Land to my Grandson James Roberts, son of Sarah V. Roberts, but if the said Sarah should die without heir my will and desire is that the Land be equally divided between my daughters Polly Gadbury Mary Charles & Grandson James Charles, son of John Charles to them and their heirs for ever. Item I give unto my daughter Mary Charles, my bay Mare called by the name of Beauty, to her and her heirs for ever. Item I give unto my Granddaughter Sarah Gadbury, my young Mare Colt called by the name of Fly, to her and her heirs for ever. Item I give unto my son

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 October 1792 On the motion of William Barry who made oath according to law and
 together with James Southall and George Marshall his co-jurors entered into and subscribed
 a power their bond in the penalty of £1000 to be paid to the said William Barry or his assigns
 in quarters him for standing attests of adon constitution, in law for ever.

Willes bequeats one Shilling Sterling. Item My Will and desire is that my
 dark bay mare called by the name of Pleasure may be sold, and the money
 arising from such sale to be put out to Interest for the benefit of my Grandson
 Thomas Roberts. Item My will and desire is that all the residue of my estate
 whatsoever not before given be sold, and the money arising from such sale to be
 equally divided between my son John Charles and my daughters Betty Godding
 and Mary Charles; and lastly I constitute my friends Joseph Vaiden and
 Henry Southall Executors of this my last Will and Testament.
