

In the name of God amen I Catharine Folkes of Charles City County being weak in body but of sound mind and disposing memory, and calling to mind the uncertainty of human life and wishing to make provision for the payment of my debts do make and Ordain this my last will and testament in manner following that is to say - It is my will and desire that all my estate both real and personal shall be sold (reserve being made of one acre of land around the burying ground) and the money arising from said sales to be applied first to the discharge of all my just debts, the balance if any to be equally divided among all my children sons and daughters to them and their heirs forever. And lastly I nominate my sons Edward Folkes and Joseph Folkes executors of this my last will and testament and that the confidence that I repose in my said sons Edward and Joseph induces me to desire that there shall be no appraisement on my estate, and that they may be permitted to qualify to this my will without giving security. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 3^d day of November 1814.

At a court held for Charles City County at the Courthouse the 15th day of Decem^r. 1814. The aforeswitten last will & testament of Catharine Folkes decd was proved by the oath of John Ellenson and the affirmations of Benjamin Brew Peter Clegg and Oliver Sadd the witnesses to the same and Ordered to be recorded and on the motion of Edward Folkes one of the executors on said will named who made oath thereto according to law and entered into and acknowledged a bond in the sum of One thousand dollars conditioned as the law directs (the will directing no security should be required) Certificate is granted to the said Edward Folkes for obtaining a probat of said will in due form. Liberty being reserved the other executor named in said will to join in the probat when he may think fit

I Cornelius Egmon of Charles City County being sick and knowing all men must die, but being in my sound senses, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, in form and manner as follows vizt. I desire that all my just debts shall be paid first of all things out of the money arising from my personal property, I give my man boy to my brother Christopher on trust that he shall take one half the produce of his labour and appropriate to the schooling of my son John, and the other half to be given to said boy at his discretion, meaning my brother Christopher. I give my molala girl Charney to my daughter Frances Felbrough Webb, to her and her heirs forever. I give to my son in law Pleasant Webb two of my guns. I give my brother Christopher any and every part of my clothes and word robe that he may choose with special directions that he keep my silver stop watch until my son John comes

comes to the years of seventeen, and then to give said webb
to him my son, I give my brother all my books to use at
his discretion until my son John arrue at the age before
mentione^d, and then to him my said son, I desire my said
brother whom I mean to be my most attentive and active
execut^{or} immediately after his hearing of my death to go to the
plantation on where I have called Swinards with two respect-
able men of Charles City County of his chusing, and take an
inventory of all my goods and chattels, also all of my personal
property, household & kitchen furniture, and all of my plantation
belongals, and them safely to keep until he can most advantage-
ously dispose of them by sale at his discretion; at the death
of my mother I desire my executors to sell my land and
plantation called Mount Pleasant, and the money equally
divided amongst my children then living. - I desire and
request and would command my executors the Surveyor or
Surveyors of them to keep my three daughters, Belsey, Talbot Ann
and Martha Dean at my mothers during my mothers life
or until either shall be married, and I herewith invest them
or either of them to use any and every species of my property to
affect that purpose, any thing and every thing to the contrary
not withstanding. - I desire and request and would even
Command if I could after death, that my son be sent for his
education to know presbyterian establishment or colleges where
presbyterians are directors. - I appoint my brother Christopher,
Pleasant Webb, Peter West and Talbert Parish executors of this
my will and testament witness my hand in my own hand,
written on this paper which every man almost in Charles City
and New Kent Counties is well acquainted with, and which
is written this 17th day of December 1813. - in Richmond

Cornelius Egmon

At a Court held for Charles City County at the fourthouse the 17th
day of November 1814. The aforwrdn last will & testament of Cornelius
Egmon decd was proved by the oath of Freeling Barrow
a witness to the same. - And at another court held for said County
as aforesaid the 15th day of Decemr following. - The said will
was further proved by the oath of Tom Allegro another witness to
the same and ordered to be recorded. Christopher Egmon one
of the executors named in said will refuses to take upon himself
the burthen of the execution thereof, & no other of said executors apply-
ing for a certificate of probat, On the motion of said Christopher Egmon
who made oath according to law and together with Wyatt
Walker Edward Fockett John M. Gregory and Joseph Vaideen his
decurries entered onto and acknowledged a bond in the penality
of Ten thousand dollars conditioned as the law directs; Certificate
is granted him for obtaining letters of administration on the
said decedent Cornelius Egmons estate with his will aforesaid
arranged in due form. - Teste
