At a Court held for Charles City County the 18th day of September 1823. The aforeswitten last will and testament of
Henry Vaughan dec^d was produced in Court and there being no subscribing witness to the same, John Tyler, Robert
W. Christian and William E. Hill were sworn and deposed that they were well acquainted with the hand writing of
said Vaughan and believe the said Will to be wholly written by the said Henry Vaughan, whereupon the same is
Ordered to be recorded... The executors therin named refused to qualify, and on the motion of Joseph Folkes
Administrator with the Will annexed granted him, who together with Edward Folkes, William Taylor and Anthony
K. Kirby his securities, entered into and acknowledge their Bond in the penalty of Seven thousand dollars, conditioned
as the law directs....
