I Elley Gregory of Charles City County and State of Virginia being in a low state of health, but of perfect sense, mind and memory, and taking into consideration the uncertainty of time here, think it best to make some distribution of the property, kind Providence has been pleased to bless me with in the following form and manner to wit: - Item, I give to my Daughter Elley Gregory a Negroe Boy named boy, and a bed with furniture, to her and her heirs forever. - Item I give to my Daughter Judith Gregory a Negroe boy named Lewis, and a bed with furniture, to her and her heirs forever. - Item, It's my will and desire that the remainder of my Negroes, not heretofore disposed of should be equally divided, amongst all my five children to wit, my two Sons Walker Gregory and James Gregory, my three Daughters to wit; Nancy Waddill, Elley Gregory and Judith Gregory to them and their heirs forever, but in case of my Daughter Nancy death, it's my wish that her son Christian Waddill shall have her full part, and in case of his death before lawfull age or dying without lawfull issue, it's my wish and desire this proportion of the Negroes, should revert to my other four children to them and their heirs forever. - It's my wish and desire, that every kind of my property not heretofore disposed of should be sold, first, to pay all my just debts, and the remainder to be equally divided,

amongst all my five children heretofore named, to them and their heirs forever, lastly I hereby constitute, and appoint my son Walker Gregory my true and lawful executor, to this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 29th day of June in the year of our Lord 1809

The said will was further proved by Rawley Vaughan the other witness thereto and was ordered to be recorded, and is truly recorded. And on the motion of the said executor who made oath as the law directs, and entered into bond and security in the penalty of five thousand Dollars conditioned according to law, certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate thereof in due form —
