In the name of God Amen, I Luke Towler of Charles City County being in common health and of sound mind and memory, and well knowing the uncertainty of life, think proper to make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, which I here do, and that in manner and form following. Item after my just debts are paid my Will is, that my whole estate both real and personal be divided into three equal parts, One third of which I give to my Wife Sally Towler during her natural life. One third I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy Parkinson to her and her heirs forever. And the other third I give and bequeath to my son Francis M. Towler to him and his heirs forever. The negroes Tom, Jada, Dauridge, Maria, Blackbone and John, together with the household

household and kitchen furniture &c. I gave my daughter Nancy Parkinson in some short time after her intermarriage with Joshua Parkinson, every species thereof worthy of notice (in order that a fair and equal division may take place between my two children) I wish to be valued or appraised either by the appraisers of my Estate or otherwise as may seem most convenient to the parties concerned, except One negro boy by the name of Claborn (as above) who deceasing soon after recd, I wish him lost out of my estate and not mentioned; and whatever said property may be found worth at the time recd. from me, my Will is, that my daughter Nancy shall be accountable for, as part of her Legacy. — Item, After the decease of my wife Sally Fowler, my Will further is that the One third part of my estate I gave her for life, be equally divided between my two children Viz. Nancy Parkinson and Francis Wayne Fowler, in what way they two may think most convenient, so that an equal division takes place. — Item, Should my son Francis W. Fowler die without a Lawful heir from his body, I leave his bequeathed Legacy to my wife Sally Fowler, to her and her heirs forever. — And lastly I leave my son Francis Wayne Fowler and my son in Law Joshua Parkinson of New Kent County Executors of this my last Will and Testament, working and making void all other former Wills heretofore by me made, and confirming this to be my last. — In Witness whereof I have herewith put my hand and affixed my seal this twenty sixth day of October One thousand eight hundred and ten.

At a Court held for Charles City County the 26 day of November 1823. This last Will and Testament of Luke Fowler deceased was presented in Court and proved by the oath of Elijah Folkes a witness to the same: Joseph Sadt one of the subscribing witnesses to said will being dead William B. Gregory and the said Elijah Folkes were sworn and severally deposed that they are well acquainted with the hand writing of said Sadt and truly believe the name to said will subscribed as a witness to be written by the said Joseph Sadt. — Whereupon said will is ordered to be recorded. And on the petition of Francis W. Fowler one of the executors in the will named who with Cuthbert according to Law are together with Benjamin Parker and Edward Comstock his executor entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of eight thousand dollars conditioned as the Law directs, certificate is granted the said Francis W. Fowler for obtaining a probat of said will in due form. — Liberty being removed the other executor named in the said Will to join in the probat when he may think fit.
