I Wm Nelson of Charles City Co do make and publish this as my last will and testament. Having given already to my daughter Edwards her proportion of my estate, I have nothing left but to declare my sincere affection for her with my other children. I desire that the debts due to me may be applied to the payment of my debts. There is at marked in the original least one hundred pounds due to me from the estate of the late Col  
Wm Nelson of York - Upwards of three hundred pounds from my brother  
Hughes estate, and nearly that sum from my brother Robert Nelson,  
something also probably from my brother Nathanael's estate, and when the  
Bullrun land of my brother Thomas is sold there will be also something  
due to me from that estate. I have also a seat in the name of Giddell  
Nelson executing of Hugh Nelson, who was surviving executor of my  
father, in the District Court at Hinsburg for my benefit, on account  
executed to my father, and given to me in part of my legacy under  
his

his wife by my eldest brother. - I mention these circumstances to show that my brother Hugh's estate is in no manner interested in it. I desire that my executors may advertise for the representatives of Monsieur Thuron & Mr. Bouchon who was in Hinsburg some years ago employed me in a suit ag<sup>t</sup> the late Carter Braxton on behalf of Thuron in the General Court and I rec<sup>d</sup> thirty pounds of it. I doubt whether Mr. Bouchon who now lives in Hinsburg is the person who employed me, but if he or any other person produces satisfactory proof of authority, I desire my executors to pay their debt in the first instance. I give to my children left me by my dear Abby whatever claim I may have to any part of Col<sup>r</sup> Byrds estate. All my estate of every kind I give to be equally divided amongst the children of my dear Abby for the reason aforesaid in the first clauses of my will. Each child shall have her share on marriage, or coming to the age of twenty one. I give my executors a discretionary power to sell my Kentucky land, if she shall think it beneficial for the payment of my debts, or for the interest of my children. I do hereby appoint my dear friend Mrs Mary Byrd of Westover my executors and guardian to my children, and do revoke all wills and memorandums of that nature heretofore made. - Witness my hand and seal at Morgantown in the County of Monongalia this twenty second day of September 1801. - All in my hand writing. -

At a Court held for Charles City County at the Courthouse the 15<sup>th</sup> day of April 1813. The aforeswitten last will and testament of William Nelson jun<sup>r</sup> was produced in Court, and there being no witnesses to the same Myall Walker Hamlin Willcox and John Tyler were sworn and severally deposed, that they are well acquainted with the testator's hand writing and verily believe the said will and the names thereto subscribed to be wholly written by the testator's own hand, whereupon the said will is ordered to be recorded. Mary Byrd the executors named in said will refuses to take upon herself the burthen of the execution thereof which is ordered to be certified. On the motion of Benjamin Harrison and William B Page who made oath according to law, and the said Harrison with John Minge his security and the said Page with Benjamin Harrison his security entered into and acknowledge<sup>d</sup> his several bonds in the penalty of twelve thousand dollars each conditioned as the law directs, certificate is granted them for obtaining letters of administration on said decedent's estate with his will aforesaid annexed in due form. -
