In the Name of God Amen I James Wiggenton of the County of ... State of ...
do hereby certify that I am the author of the my Last Will & Testament in Writing and
I am following it.

I give to my son William Wiggenton one Negro man named Louis and his three children named
Henry Emily & Mary with their future increase, also one Youth named Henry now in his Service to
him and his heirs forever.

Item I give to my Friend Province McJinnick son of Trustee one Negro man named Bob also
one Negro man named Mary and his three children named Frank in future increase for this
the said Ben J. C. of my Daughter Elizabeth Reynolds so long as he may live and after his death they
the said Negroes shall be equally divided among his children, also all the furniture purchased at the sale
of the late Reynolds sold under a deed of Trust in favour of me which purchase is excepted on a Bond
given by him in 1825 for seven thousand and fifty dollars. I also give the Balance of the Bond
on his Use. I also release them from the Payment of Two Hundred & seventy Dollars loaned by my
Money on the late and Ben J. C. of the said Family. Also the Stock and Farming Utensils all of
which I give to my Friend Province McJinnick for the Use of Ben J. C. of my Daughter Elizabeth
Province McJinnick I become security for the late Reynolds in a Note to William J. C. of Wm.
Jackson Esq. and of my Estate should have to pay the Money then in ^{that} the Property decedent for the
Use of Ben J. C. of my Daughter Elizabeth Reynolds shall be sold for the Payment of the same, or so much
thereof as shall be necessary.

Item I give to my son James Wiggenton one Negro man by name Elizabeth her two children
Marion & William to him and his heirs forever.

Money on the bill and Bond of the said Family & also the Stock and Fairs of the said Family
which I give to my Son James Province Negro Man to pay the said Bond of my Daughter E. P. Reynolds
Province & whereas I became security for the said Reynolds in a Note to the said John & Co. of the
said Bond and of my Estate should have to pay the Money then in due the Property of the said
said Bond of my Daughter E. P. Reynolds should be sold for the Payment of the same in so much
thereof as shall be necessary.

Item I give to my Son James Bluffington one Negro Woman by Name Elizabeth her two Children
Mountable Claims to her and her Heirs Executors and their Increase

Item I give to my Son Benjamin Bluffington one Negro Woman named Jane and her two Children to her
and her Heirs Executors and their Increase and the future Increase of the above Negroes and the
Balance of my Estate to be divided between my three Sons to wit James & Benj. they paying my just
Debts and funeral Expenses the Negroes say Mountable James & Joseph to be divided by a Appraisalment
and be sold for.
