

Will of Penelope Stribling - Dec.

In the Name of God Amen - I Penelope Stribling knowing the uncertainty of Life and the certainty of Death and being in a weak state of bodily health but of sound disposing Mind and Memory, I therefore do hereby declare this to be my last Will and Testament in manner and form as follows - Item 1 It has been my Will and has been for some time to give and bequeath unto Susan Ship the Sum of Fifty Dollars.

Item 2nd I give and bequeath unto William Ship the Sum of Fifty Dollars.

Item 3rd I give and bequeath unto William Ship the Sum of Fifty Dollars.

Item 4th The Balance of my property of whatever description after paying all my just Debts and funeral expences I give and bequeath unto my Friend Civil Baker with the injunction that the above Bequests shall be faithfully paid. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my Hand and affixed my Seal this fourth Day of February in the Year of our Lord one Thousand Eight Hundred and thirty six.
