Also I give and bequeath to my beloved wife during her life all my negroes, house hold furniture and stock, and all and every part of my Estate whatsoever during her life time, and after her decease it is to be Equally divided amongst all my Children except my negro wrench Molly is worth Child now then that child is to go to my Daughter Nancy, I consider my Granddaughter Rhoda and include her among the rest of my children and as to have an Equal part with them. I confirm this and no other to be my last will and Testament. In witness whereof I have put my hand and seal this first day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety three, My wife and my son Matthew to act as Executors - to be sealed
