

Morgan's In the name of God Amen Charles Morgan of Sulpeper County in the
Vill Parish of St Marks being sick and weak in Body but of Sound Memory &
understanding do make this my Last Will & Testament in Manner &
form following viz

First of all they Will is that all my Just Debts & funeral Expenses be first paid
Them I give and Bequeath unto my two Daughters viz Ann Wright & Eliza
Cornelius my Tract of Land whereon I now live containing one Hundred & fifty
acres more or less to be Equally Divided between them as they may agree to
them and their Heirs forever But it is my Desire that my Land should not be
sold

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I desire that my negro fellow slave may be sold and the money arising
from the sale shall be let out on Interest for my Grandson Charles Morgan
Thornhill & my Executor to pay to my said Grandson Charles Morgan Thornhill
the money when he shall arrive to the age of twenty one years and if
my Grandson Charles Morgan Thornhill should die without Heir then the
money to be Equally Divided between my two Daughters Ann Wright &
Eliza Cornelius and their Heirs forever, but as there is some speculation
that my son in Law Bryant Thornhill Will bring suit against my two
Daughters for the Land given them by me & proceed to should
bring a suit and Recover the Land then the money arising from

The Sale of my Negroe Sam shall go from my Grandson Charles Morgan
Whom I sell unto my two Daughters Ann Wright & Milley Cornelius to be
Equally Divided between them & their Heir forever

Item I give to my Daughter Ann Wright one bed & Furniture her first Choice

Item I give to my Daughter Milley Cornelius one bed & Furniture her second Choice

Item I give my Cooper's & Carpenter's Tools & wearing apparel to be Equally
Divided between my two Grandsons Morgan Wright & Charles Cornelius

Item I give unto Elizabeth Jones for her Trouble with me in my Sickness

One Bed & Furniture belongs to it & Ten pounds seed Cotton & a pair
of Cotton and Wool Cards Eulpeke County Virginia Mills
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Dish & two good plates & two spoons

Item my son in Law Absolom Cornelius is owing me for a Negro wench
Sixty pounds with Interest from the time my bond became due for the
Wench which money I desire may be made use of to discharge my
Just Debts

Item all the rest of my estate after Discharging my Just Debts I leave
to be Equally Divided between my Daughter Ann Wright & Milley
Cornelius

Item my Daughter Ann Wright is to have my great & my Daughter
Milley Cornelius is to have Birkett on the New Postament

I appoint Harry Salisbury Thomas Wright & Absolom Cornelius
Executors of this my last Will and Testament In Witness
whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this third day of
February One thousand seven Hundred & Eighty two.

At about held for Culpeper County the 18th Day of Feb^y 1782

This last Will and Testament of Charles Morgan Dec^d was
Exhibited to the Court by Thomas Wright and Absolom Cornelius
Two of the Executors therein named and was proved by the oaths
of Reuben Thornhill and Absolom Bradley two of the Witnesses
thereto and Ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of the
said Executors Certificate is granted them for Obtaining a
probate thereof in due form they having sworn to the same
and given bond & security according to Law.
