3. I do forgive to my son Stephen Harrenspager the Debt he  
owes me likewise I give to him for his Portion of the Heritage

from my house <sup>at my death</sup> and shall be contented with the

I do bequeath to my Dearly beloved Grandson Harrison  
my son Stephenson hundred Acres of Land with the Planta-  
tion I have lived upon that he may take Possession of it after  
the Decease of my Wife

I do bequeath unto my three Grand Daughters my son

Acres of Land, I say I do bequeath this portion to Barbara
