Memory Thanketh to almighty God for the same and make this my last
Will and Testament in manner and form following first I recommend
my Soul to God that gave it trusting and surely believing that through
the Merits of my beloved Saviour Jesus Christ to receive full Remission
and forgiveness of all my sins my Body I commend to the earth to be buried
at the Discretion of any Executors hereafter Named

First

I give unto my Beloved Son John Blankenbush the use of my house
Plantation whereon I now live during the term of her life as also of
Woods and Chattels for her life time and after the said my Beloved
Decease that tract of Land whereon I now live on containing one
and fifty Acres shall fall to my loving Son Christopher Blankenbush
for his inheritance and he his heirs forever and I give unto my Son
Christopher Blankenbush one house Lot and parcel after my Decease

Secondly

I give unto my beloved Son John Blankenbush one Tract of Land
containing three hundred and twenty Acres for him and his heirs forever I give unto
my Son John Blankenbush one house Lot and parcel after my Decease

Thirdly

I give unto my Deceased Son Isaac Blankenbush Eight pounds that he

Decease That tract of Land whereon I now live on containing one
and fifty Acres shall fall to my loving Son Christopher Plankentbecker
for his inheritance and his heirs forever and I give unto my Son
Christopher one house Lot and a parcel of land after my Decease

Secondly I give unto my beloved Son John Plankentbecker my Tract of Land
containing three hundred and Twenty Acres for him and his heirs forever I give unto
my Son John Plankentbecker one house Lot and a parcel of land after my Decease

Thirdly I give unto my Deceased Son George Plankentbecker Eight Hundred thirty
three Acres of Land to his Son John Plankentbecker Junr. to have and his heirs forever

333 And after the above said my Estate divided between my two Sons John
Blanchbacher & Christopher Blanchbacher and John Blanchbacher being
deceased Son George Blanchbacher then Son John then the said my Son
John Blanchbacher and Christopher Blanchbacher is to receive unto the said
John Blanchbacher one Eight Pound and the said Money and all the
Effects of the above said Estate is to be left in the Executors hands till I or
John Blanchbacher first come to age and if that I or John Blanchbacher
I or should die before the said age and then the above said Money and
Effects is to fall to my two Sons John Blanchbacher & Christopher
Blanchbacher and their heirs forever.

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Lastly I make and contain my last and full Will and Testament
bearing date of May 22nd 1766 of this my last Will and Testament
revoking all other Wills by me made and in Witness whereof
my last Will and Testament I have hereunto set my own hand
this Twenty third day of June 1766 A^d
