Dowry live in my family during her single state - Item My Will and desire is that at the death of my loving wife Frances Dowry I give unto my son Richard Dowry one negro boy named Jack, and to my son James Dowry one negro boy named Daniel and to my son Jesse Dowry I give one negro boy named Billy, and to my son Thomas Dowry I give one negro boy named Agnes and to my daughter Sally Dowry I give one negro girl named Nancy, and to my daughter Jane Dowry I give one negro boy named Wilson but to be exchanged for a girl of the same age hereafter should there be one raised of the negroes lent to my wife and I give to my daughter Polly Dowry one negro girl named Grace which said Negroes and their increase I give to my said children singly of severally to them and their heirs for ever - Item I give to my daughter Elizabeth Dowry the negro girl before excepted named Mourning to be at her disposal when she pleases, which said negro and her increase I give to my said daughter and her heirs forever. Item My Will of desire is that if either of my children die before the division of my Estate lent to my wife my will is that their legacy be equally divided among the rest of my children,

and should any one of the above ^{names} die before the legator or legatee possess them legally that in that case the legator or legatee shall have another child than he or she raised - Item My will is that if my wife should die before my daughter Polly arriv to the age of twelve year that my estate be kept together till my said daughter arriv to that age - Item My will & desir is that the child my negro woman Fanny is now pregnant with, should it be born alive be given to Mephew Isaac Dowry, which said negro Fanny is now lent to my wife, also I give to my said Mephew Isaac Dowry ten pounds to be raised out of the crops made on the plantation and by the negroes lent to my wife, all of which I give to him & his heirs forever - Item I give to my Mephew Thomas Dowry the sturly seven dollars I paid on his account to Coratt Nelson which I give to him & his heirs forever - Item I give - My desire is that at the death of my wife my land lent to her be equally divided among my four sons namely Richard, Isaac, Isaac & Thomas Dowry upon my 2 sons paying my four daughters namely Elizabeth, Sally, Jane & Polly Dowry, also my niece Mary Rachel Dowry twenty pounds each, which I give to them and their heirs forever - Item My will is that my two sons James and Isaac Dowry have three years schooling - Item My desire is that all my negroes and their increase not before divided together with all my stock household and kitchen furniture and plantation utensils be equally divided among all my children which I give to them and their heirs forever - Item I appoint Isaac Dowry of Thomas Dowry my sole executor to this my last will and testament ratifying & confirming the same in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand of real this day of date above written -
