penet's bank along the line to the old Road thence down the said
Road to Trach line.

Now I give and devise and bequeath to my son Robert
Williamson all the residue and remainder of the said Tract
of Land I now live on to him and his heirs or assigns forever.
My devise is after my Debt is paid the residue and remainder
of my Estate to be left to maintain my Wife and Children
till my son George comes to the age of eighteen years old and

that my son George comes to the age of eighteen years old and
then to be equally divided between my Wife and all my Children
and that my Wife have an equal part during her Natural Life
and then to be equally divided between all my Children
I desire that my sons may be for themselves at the
age of eighteen years old and to receive their Estates at that age
but still to be kept under Guardianship till they come to twenty
years of age and my desire is that my Estate shall not
be managed badly I make and constitute my said son George
Williamson Arthur Moffley and Edward Mosefont Executors
of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all Wills
by me formerly made and Witness my Hand and Seal this
eighteen day of January one thousand seven hundred and fifty six.
