

In the Name of God Amen - The eighteenth day of February in the
 our Lord One Thousand seven hundred & forty five. I Alexander
 Hamilton of Elizabeth City County in the Colony of Dominion of
 Merchant, being sick & weak in body, but of perfect mind &
 (thanks be given unto God therefore) calling unto mind the mortality
 of my body, & knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do
 and ordain this my Last Will & Testament. That is to say, writing
 partly & first of all I give & recommend my Soul into the hands
 of God who gave it, And for my body I recommend it to the Earth (when God shall call me out of this life) to be buried
 in a Christian like & decent manner, at the discretion of
 my Executors, nothing doubting but that at the General Resur-
 rection I shall receive the same again by the power of God.
 And as touching such worldly Goods wherewith it hath pleased
 God to bless me in this life, I give devise & dispose of the
 same in the following manner & form, Vizt.

I give & bequeath to Mary my dearly beloved Wife all & singular my Lands houses slaves goods chattels & all other thing or things do belong to me, by her freely to be received & enjoyed & at all times to be dispos'd of by her her heirs & assigns for ever. And I do hereby constitute make & ordain Wilson Earle, Miles Cary, Gentlemen, Charles Jenings Junr, and the said wife (all of them of the said County & Colony) my only Executors & Executrix of this my Last Will & Testament. And I do hereby utterly disallow revoke & disannul all & every other former Settlements Wills Legacies Executors by me in any before this time named willed & bequeathed. Ratifying & confirming this & no other to be my Last Will & Testament. Whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal the day & year above written.

Sig'd and pronounced & declared by the said Alexander Hamilton as his last Will & Testament in presence of us
