

In the name of God Amen - I William Lewis of the County of Barriss of Elizth City being Sick and Weak in Body but of perfect mind and memory, calling to mind the uncertainty of this life, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament - To wit -

I give unto my Son William Lewis the tract of Land I now live upon Containing by Estimation One hundred and forty two Acres, to him and his heirs for ever but my farther intent is that my S^{on} should not have possession of the said Land untill he arrive to Lawfull age, and four years after that my desire is that he shall pay Each of his Surviving Sisters ten Pounds Current money of Virginia and If my Son William should die before he come to Lawfull age I give the said tract of Land to be Equally divided among my four daughters Namely Jane, Sarah, Elizth Ann. or their Heirs for ever. Then I leave My tract of Land in the lower part of Fox hill to be sold to help pay my debts. Then I give the remainder of my Estate after my just debts are all payed to be Equally divided among my daughter Jane Sarah Elizabeth & Ann or their Heirs for ever and if Either of my said daughters should die before they come of age or marry I give the part of the acc^t to be Equally Divided amongst my Surviving Daughters. Then I appoint my

Friends Mark Hall & William Latimer Executors to this my last will and Testament - In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my Hand and seal this 26th day of November 1792.
