our Lord God one thousand seven hundred & eighteen I William Covington of the County
of York in the Colony of Virginia being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind &
memory thanks be given to God, therefore calling to mind the mortality of my body & knowing
that it is appointed for all men once to dye doe make and ordain this my last will
& Testament that is to say principally & first of all I give and bequeath my soul
into the hands of Almighty God that gave it & for my body I bequeath it to if Earth
to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the direction of my Executors
nothing doubting but at the good will & satisfaction I shall receive the same again of
the mighty power of God and as touching such worldly estate as it hath been please
God to give me with in this life I give devise and direct by these in the following man-
ner and form. **Imprimis** I give & bequeath unto my two sons Thomas Covington &
William Covington all my Quarter Land that I purchased of Jacobus Chow. Equally to be
divided in Quality as well as Quantity when my son Thomas attains the age of twenty one
years to be divided and after division made the said Thomas and my Executor to test & set
for his share and his heirs I give to them and their heirs for ever, except one of them above
named Thomas Covington should die without Lawfull issue, then to go to his next
heir and his heirs for ever. **Item** I give and bequeath unto my three other sons John
Richard & Edmund, all the rest of my Land that I now live on or adjoining any ways
thereunto to them and their heirs for ever equally to be divided as well in quality as
quantity. **Item** I give and bequeath unto my son Wm Covington first & my three
sons last mentioned John Richard & Edmund Covington all my water grist mill with
all the Land and appurtenances thereunto belonging to them and their heirs for ever equally
to be divided, and if either of them should die without Lawfull issue I give that part
to my son William Covington & his heirs for ever. **Item** I give unto my
beloved wife Rebecca Covington one third part of my Land that I now live on or any
ways thereunto adjoining (as before mentioned) during her natural life. **Item** I give
unto my loving wife Rebecca Covington & my severall Children (hereafter named)
Thomas, Elizabeth, Catharine, Anne, Wm, John, Richard & Edmund Covington, all the
rest of my estate both real & personal, to wit my negroes household goods & chattels
and all other moveable effects equally to be divided amongst them; and it is my will and
desire that if any of my Children should die within their minority that then that or their
part of my estate to be equally divided amongst the rest of my surviving Children to them
their heirs for ever. **Lastly** I do appoint my loving wife Rebecca Covington to be
the whole and sole Executor of this my last will & Testament and I do hereby utterly disavow
revoke and disannull all other wills and Testaments whatsoever.
