

In the name of God amen the 20th day of March in the year of
 our Lord God one thousand seven hundred & eighteen I William Covington of the County
 of Gloucester in the Colony of Virginia being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind &
 memory thankes be given to God therefore calling to mind the mortality of my body & knowing
 that it is appointed for all men once to dye do make and ordain this my last will
 & Testament that is to say principally & first of all of God and recommend my soul
 into the hands of almighty God that gave it & for my body I command it to be Earth
 to be buried in a Christian way and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors
 nothing doubting but at the general Resurrection I shall receive the same again by
 the mighty power of God and as touching my worldly estate as it hath beene bea-
 coned to stop me with in this life I give devise and dispose of the same in the following man-
 ner and form. **Imprimis** I give & bequeath unto my son Thomas Covington &
 William Covington all my Quarter Land that I purchased of Lord Culpeper originally to be
 divided in Equality as well as Quantity when my son Thomas attains the age of twenty one
 years to be divided and after devision made to my son Thomas and my daughter to testaments
 for his heirs and his wife I give to them and their heirs for ever except one of them above
 named Thomas D'Albemarle should die without Lawfull issue then to go to his last
 heir and his heirs for ever. Item I give and bequeath unto my three other sons John
 Richard & Edmund Covington all the rest of my Land that I now live on or adjoining any ways
 thereto to them and their heirs for ever equally to be divided as well in quality as
 quantity. Item I give and bequeath unto my son Wm Covington Junr & my three
 sons last mentioned John Richard & Edmund Covington all my water grist mill with
 all the land and appurtenances thereto belonging to them and their heirs for ever equally
 to be divided and if either of them should die without Lawfull issue I give that part
 to my son William Covington to his heirs for ever. Turned over Item I give unto my
 loving wife Agamond Covington one third part of my Land that I now live on or any
 ways thereto adjoining (as before mentioned) during her natural life. Item I give
 unto my loving wife Agamond Covington & my several children (hereafter named)
 Thomas, Elizabeth, Catharine, Anne, Wm, John, Richard & Edmund Covington all the
 rest of my estate both personal & personal; to wit my negroes hewton goods & chattels
 and all other moveables to be divided equally to be divided amongst them; and it is my will and
 desire that if any of my children should dye within their minority that then that or their
 part of my estate to be equally divided amongst the rest of my surviving children to them
 their heirs for ever. Lastly I do appoint my loving wife Agamond Covington to be
 the whole and sole Executor of this my Last will & Testament and I do hereby utterly disallow
 revoke and disannul all other Wills and Testaments what so ever.
