 I give to my Son Thomas my Slave, them I give also my other personable Estate money
 whatch I have bought horses Horses and what other espe. I have not already given &
 give to be equally divided amongst my said four Children John & Thomas &
 Mary and Elizabeth & Robert. Lastly I nominate & appoint my two Sons John
 and Thomas Executors to this my Last Will & Testament. In witness whereof I

 in manner & form following viz: first I give my Soul to God that gave it.

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and my body to the Earth to be buried at the direction of my friends after named in hopes of
the pardon of my Sins by the merciful death or passion of my Saviour & Redeemer Jesus Christ
according to the true faith of a Christian. Secondly as to my worldly goods I give as follows to
Him I give to my son being my son Daniel Triplet my Dwelling plantation & all the lands
belonging to it to him & his heirs for ever. Thirdly I give to my God Daughter Jean Miller
my mare and two geldings to her and her heirs. Fourthly I give to her Landman my young
mare and if I should die in a short time that is before she is married, will that she shall
live upon my plantation as long as she lives a Single life and that she shall have a
stairstaircase found her out of his Estate. fifthly I will that whereas I have agreed with
Robert Amysall to be my Executor to look after my plantation this ensuing year to make a
Leap I will that in case I should die before the year is ended that the steeds should remain
with his care till the Leap is finished & that nothing that is now on his plantation
shall be removed till the Leap is finished. Sixthly I will that all the rest of my estate except
my Wearing clothes & my wised husbands wearing clothes, be equally divided between my
brothers and sisters that is to say all my real & personal estate except what I have
already given I give to be equally divided between Jean Miller & William Triplet &
Jean Miller & Eleanor Elliston & their heirs that is to say all my Negros, goods,
fattles, household goods, sheep, steeps, hogs, money, servants, corn, Wheat & all that
are due to me, I will that after my debts are paid that they all be equally divided
between Jean Miller & William Triplet & Jean Miller & Eleanor Elliston as
aforesaid & their heirs. Seventhly & lastly I ordain & constitute & appoint my two
brothers John Miller & William Triplet my Executors to this my Last Will & Testament
In witness whereof I do subscribe set my hand and seal this 24th day of November 1724.
