First, it is my Will, and desire that all my just debts & funeral charges be fully paid & discharged, Secondly, I give & bequeath the Land whereon I now live to my two Sons Richard & Vincent Bauthorn, to be equally divided between them & their Heirs forever. It is my Will & desire that the whole of my Estate, both real & personal, (except the Land before mentioned) be inventoried & appraised, out of which I give to my two Sons before mentioned viz. Richard & Vincent Five pounds Cash to each; & unto my grand-Daughter, Elizabeth Bauthorn Four pounds for ever, And the rest or remainder of my Estate I desire to be equally divided amongst my other Children, viz. Alice Bauthorn, Elizabeth Fore Acres, Mary Guest, Ann Dunn & Mildred Bauthorn, to them & their Heirs forever. And Lastly I do appoint my two Sons Alice & Richard Bauthorn to be the Executors of this my Last Will & Testament, In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & Seal

bequeathed to them & their heirs forever. And lastly I do appoint
my two Sons Rice & Richard Cauthorn to be the Executors of this my last
Will & Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal
