Item 4<sup>d</sup> It is my will that the plantation wherein I now live as well as all the rest and residue of the property of every description which I may die possessed of shall be sold immediately after my decease to the best advantage and the monies arising therefrom be laid in the stock of the bank of Alexandria for the benefit of my Children Equally. And it is my will that when any or either of my Children shall arrive at Lawful age or marrie that then they shall be at liberty to demand & receive an equal share of the bank stock.

Item 5<sup>d</sup> it is my will and desire that my dear brother Dennis Ramsay & my dear Brother in Law Robert Allison be my Executors to carry this my last will into effect and request of them to be the Guardians and friends of my Children.

Item 6<sup>d</sup> I will that all the charges attended my decease may




