In the name of God Amen this 9th day of October 1803 I Jeremiah Moaly of the County of Fauquier being weak in body altho in perfect mind and memory thanks be given to almighty god for the same and calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing it is appointed for all men once to die do make this my last will and testament and do Revoke all wills heretofore made by me that is to say principally and first of all I give and Recommend my soul who gave it and as for my body I Recommend it to the Earth to be buried in a Christian like manner at the discretion of my Executors hereafter mentioned nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall Receive again by the mighty power of God and as touchings such worldly Estate as it hath pleased the almighty god to Bless me with in this life I give devise and dispose of the same in manner and form following that is to say. Item my will and devise is all my just debts and funeral charges should be paid and discharged. Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Sibelia Moaly one tract of land purchased of Baylor Jennings supposed to contain one hundred & twenty four Acres two negroes namely Jane and her son Jarrett to her and her heirs forever. the above negroes is in lieu of those negroes left her by her Grand father Morris mill. Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Hannah two negroes namely Polly and her son Harry the above negroes is in lieu of those negroes left her by her Grand father Morris mill. I also give her negro Lewis to her and her heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Hannah all the profits that arises from the plantation whereon I now live as well as that I purchased of Mr Thomas Keiths Estate to help raise my two sons James and Solomon untill my son James arives to the lawfull age of twenty one years then the whole of the said land whereon I now live to be equally divided the upper part I then give and devise to my son James the lower part I leave to my wife during her life and at her death to devolve to my son Solomon to them and their heirs forever. I also lend unto my wife during her life three negroes namely Niten his wife Suck and their son Danick and her choice of beds and furniture and all the Remainder of my household and kitchen furniture Except the remainder of my beds and at her death the said negroes and furniture to be equally divided between my two sons James and Solomon. Item I give all the remainder and Residue of my Estate let it consist in what kind or quality soever to be equally divided between my two sons when they arive at lawfull age or marry. Except one feather bed and furniture to each of my daughters Sibelia and Hannah which they are to receive when they arive at lawfull age or marry. And Lastly I do appoint my friend Sanders Morris Executor to this my last will and testament. 
