uncertainty of this mortal life, and being of sound and perfect
mind and memory, blessed be the Almighty God for the same;
to make and publish this my last Will and Testament in manner
and form following. That is to say. I bind my dear be-
loved wife Ann Duncan the plantation whereon I now live,
and all the Tracts of Land I hold adjoining thereunto, with all
the Stock of Hogs, Cattle, Sheep, Horses, &c thereon, and a few
Negroes viz. Charles, Punch, Phillis and Will with their im-

plements, and household, and Kitchen Furniture during her natural

life. I also give hundred money and Crops shall be in my possession
at my Death, which is to be at the disposal of the Executors. And all
the debts that shall be due from my Estate at my Death, I owe and
desire therefore Ann Duncan my wife to pay out of that part of
the Estate, I leave her during her natural life. Item I give
and bequeath to my Son John Duncan a Negro Girl named Peg
now, with her increase forever. Item I give and bequeath to my
Daughter Lydia Hancock, the sum of twenty shillings (together with her
part of the Estate when she is first married). Item I give and
devise to my Son Field Ullin Duncan a Negro Woman named
Agg, and her Daughter Lydia, with their increase forever.
Item I leave and bequeath to my Son George Duncan a Negro

Woman named Sally, and her increase forever. Item
I give and devise to my Daughter Lucy a Negro girl named
Sarah, and a Boy named Miffins, with their increase forever.
Item I leave and devise to my Son George Duncan a Negro
Boy named Skip, and all the lands, house or otherwise thereon
and adjoining thereto also all my Household and Kitchen Furniture
after the death of my wife to him and his heirs forever.
Item I leave and bequeath to my Daughter Holly Harmony
Duncan, a Negro Girl named Abby, with her increase forever.
Item I give and devise to my Son Sandy Patterson Duncan
a Negro Girl named Peg, and a Boy named Skip to him
and his heirs forever. Lastly my will and desire is that after
the decease of my wife all the Negroes I bind her to equally

Divided among my Sons, provided neither of them leave the Negroes given them, in that case whichever son or Sons shall loose the Negroe given him or them, shall make choice of one of the Negroes I have left my wife at her death, and the surplus equally divided among my Children, my will and desire is that none of my Sons shall profest their Estate before they arrive at the age of twenty one Years - But shall be under the Government of their Grandmothers. If either of my Sons should dye without an Heir it is my desire that their Estate shall be equally divided among their surviving Brothers.

Lastly I do hereby constable and my friend John Scott,

and my Son Field Allen Duncan Executors to this my last Will and Testament, and my loving wife Ann Duncan
