The 17 day of February in the Year of our Lord 1780. I Mary
Pasley of Shenandoah County being sick and weak
in Body but of perfect mind and memory and calling to mind
the mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for
all men once to die do make and ordain this my last Will and
Testament, as Touching such worldly Estate wherewith it has
pleased God to bless me in this life. I give devise and dispose of the
same in manner and form following that to wit In the first
place it is my devise that all my just Debts be paid and
then I give to my eldest Son Solomon Pasley one Dish and four
plates, and to my Daughter Mary Galtsoy one Dish and four
plates and two Bushells and a half of Corn. I give to my young-
est Son Robert Pasley to him and his Heirs forever one Feather
Bed and furniture, ^{bed} one large Dish and potrack
two Bushells and a half of Corn, one Trench two Earthen plates
and one Bottle. I also lend to my Daughter Sally Haggard
during her natural life one Feather Bed and furniture

Chest and Table two Wheels one pair Cotton Cards one
great Pot and half one new 168 Shag my horses and flocks

One Basin four painted Spoons and two Bushells and half of Corn
lenturn to her Children to them and their Heirs forever at her decease
And then the remainder of my worldly goods I desire may be sold
and the money divided in the following manner To my eldest
Son Solomon Pasley I give one third part of the sum of the said
Money to him and his Heirs forever To my Daughter Susan one
part I lend another third part of the money and desire that it
may be paid to her Daughter Molly Garrison when she comes of
age or married. And the other third of the said Money I lend
to my Daughter Molly Galtsoy and desire it may be paid
to her Daughter Mary Watson Galtsoy when she comes of
age or married and I do hereby utterly disavow revoke and
disannul all other Wills and Testaments by me made or made
by me touching the disposing and confirming this to be
my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof have hereunto
set my hand and Seal the day and Year first above written.
