one Negro Woman named Nancy to be owned forever slaves
also I give unto my beloved Daughter Grankey Lane one female
Negro girl named Ann during her life if she has a Master here at
her birth to be sold and if not it is to return to William Lane and
Unity Rose also I give all that I have or may have to William Lane
and Unity Rose and Grankey Lane except my clothes they
are to be equally divided between all my daughters and daughters in
law William Lane and Unity Rose whom I choose constitute
make and cause the sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testa-
ment all and singular my lands and possessions to be sold and

Be it known of the many with all my other estate both real and personal including six Negro slaves namely, a Man named Jack, a Woman named Hannah and her child a boy named Job, a Woman named Doll and two Boys named Lucy and Frank I give and bequeath unto my three children to wit Sophia P. Harmer, William Fugger Harmer and Joseph T. Harmer between them to be equally divided to them and their heirs forever. And in case of the death of either one or more of my said children without a lawful heir my will and desire is that the survivor or survivors shall possess and enjoy the part hereby bequeathed to the child or children to enjoy. I appoint my friend John M. Harmer, Reuben Brewster and John Thistlethwaite Jr. Executors of this my last Will and Testament hereby making and making the same to be witnessed by me hereunto annexed. well known as the Penick slaves and entered into and acknowledged and
I do pay him hundred dollars with interest thereon, Penick
say unto Penick Black his widow continues as the law
now grants him for damages of which there is no proof
