In the names of God, Amen. I John Say of the County of  
Fluvanna, being in a low State of health in body, but in my right  
senses and memory, thanks be to Almighty God for the same, and  
calling to mind the Mortality of man, that it is appointed unto  
men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and Testament  
in manner and form following, Looking all other Wills by me before  
made and justly recommending my soul to God who gave it  
Secondly my Will and desire is that my just debts and expenses  
charges be paid.

I give and bequeath unto my living wife Rebekah Say one  
land and plantation wherein I now live, during her widowhood  
and after her death or Widowshead, I then give the said land and plantation  
on to my son Elisha; and his heirs forenoon lawfully gotten by his body  
and if my said son Elisha should die without heirs lawfully begotten  
by his body, my will is that these lands shall be sold, and equally  
divided among my other children.

I also give and bequeath unto my said wife my two negroes  
Woman, named Seta and Man, them and their increase to my Stock  
of hens, cattle, hogs and Sheep without household furniture and  
plantation tools, and all moveables now in my possession during  
her Widowshead or Natural life, and after her death, or Widowshead  
my wife and none other than she requires and may need and in  
case of any Elise shall be sold and equally divided amongst my
