 part of my Estate. Item I give and bequeath unto my dear  
 and loving Wife all the remaining part of my Estate both real and  
 personal to dispose of the same as she shall think proper, and  
 I do hereby constitute, ordain and appoint her to be the whole  
 and Sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testament In  
 Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this  
 twentieth day of August in the Year of our Lord one thousand  
 seven hundred and eighty three.

And first I desire that all my Just Debts be paid. Item my Will and desire is that all my movable Estate and the plantation whereon I now live be left to my will beloved wife Mary Hunt during her natural life or Widowhood without being interrupted except one Feather Bed which I give to my Daughter Margit Hunt. Item I give to my two Sons John and Robert Hunt my land whereon I now live to be equally divided according to the Judgement of Mr. Daskett Robert Hunt to be by them possessed after my wife deceas and all the rest of my Estate after my wife deceas to be sold and equally divided among all my children
