Impresment I lend unto my Son also Stone during his natural life two Negroes to wit, a Woman named Diley and her Son Siman and their increase and after his decease I give the said Negroes to his Children and their Heirs to be equally divided between them, and for want of such Child or children I give the said Negroes to his Brothers and Sisters to be equally divided between them. Impresment I give unto Son Elijah Stone and his heirs forever a Negro fellow named Bob. Impresment I give to William Woolins Son of Joseph Woolins begot on my Daughter Elizabeth now deceased and his Heirs a Negro Woman named Hannah and a Negro Boy named

Sons of my said Son William Stone and to his Heirs for
 ever the land and plantation wherein I lately lived in Henrico
 containing by Estimation one hundred and thirty Acres.
 I give unto my Son Thomas Stone during his natural
 life a Negro fellow named Butte a Negro Woman named Jane
 and a Negro Boy named Ben and their increase; and after
 his decease I then give the said Negroes to his Children and
 their Heirs to be equally divided among them and in default
 of such Children I then give the said Negroes to his Brothers
 and their Heirs to be equally divided among them.
 I give to my Son Hezekiah Stone the land and plan-
 tation wherein I now live containing by Estimation eight hundred
 Acres to him and his Heirs forever. I also give to my said Son
 Hezekiah all my Stock of Hogs a Horse called Squire and the
 Stock of Sheep after his Mother's death. I also lend to my said
 Son during his natural life the following Negroes to wit, a
 Woman named Moll a Boy named Sumner a Girl named
 Sarah and a fellow named Numbly; and after his decease I
 then give the said Negroes and their increase to his Children and
 their Heirs and in default of such Children I then give the said
 Negroes to his Brothers and their Heirs to be equally divided
 among them. I give my Son Mabel Stone and
 to his Heirs forever a Negro Girl named Moll and her increase.
 I lend to my loving Wife Frances Taylor Stone

UNLESS this Will to be equally divided; I further give unto my
 said Wife all the rest and residue of my Estate not before disposed
 of during her natural life and after her decease I then desire
 the same may be equally divided between all my Sons ex-
 cept Hezekiah; and in case any of my Sons should be dead
 at the time of the division my Will and desire is that my
 Children shall be entitled to such part to be equally divided
 among them. I also further lend to my said Wife ^{during her natural life} two other

Item I give unto my Son Anne Woodson one Negro Man named Mark, now in my possession and all the Estate I have before given him now in his possession to him and his heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath unto my Son Patrick Woodson the whole of my Estate now in his possession except Negroes Frank and Janny, which I lend unto my wife Frances Woodson during her life and after her decease to return to my Son Patrick Woodson. I lend to my Daughter Mary Ann Woodson one Negro Man named Toby during her life, and after her decease Toby to return to Benjⁿ Fitzpatrick and Moll to Joseph Fitzpatrick to them and their heirs forever. I lend unto my Daughter Frances Anderson and my Son in Law George Anderson one hundred Acres of Land and the plantation whereon they now live during their lives and after their decease to return to George Anderson Jun^r to him and his heirs forever. I also lend my said Son in Law and Daughter four Negroes - Lucy, Sabell, Shores and Amey during their lives and after their decease to be equally divided among their Children then living except Benjamin Anderson. I give and bequeath unto my Grand Daughter Elizabeth Bull Woodson five head of Cattle to her and her heirs forever. I give and bequeath to my Grandson Benjamin Anderson
