I William Stone of the County of Albemarle being of sound mind and memory to make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, first I desire that all my just debts and funeral expences be paid. Impoverish I lend unto my son a late Stone during his natural life two Negroes to wit a Woman named Dibeey and her Son Siman and their increase and after his decease I give the said Negroes to his Children and their Heirs to be equally divided between them, and for want of such Child or children I give the said Negroes to his Brothers and Sisters to be equally divided between them. Impoverish I give unto my Son Elijah Stone and his heirs forever a Negro fellow named Bob. Impoverish I give to William Woolens Son of Joseph Woolens begot on my Daughter Elizabeth now deceased and his Heirs a Negro Woman named Hannah and a Negro Boy named

Impremis I give unto my Son William Stone and to his Heirs for
 ever the land and plantation whereon I lately lived in Henrico
 containing by Estimation one hundred and thirty Acres.
 Impremis I lend unto my Son Thomas Stone during his natural
 life a Negro fellow named Bobe a Negro Woman named Jane
 and a Negro Boy named Ben and their increase, and after
 his decease I then give the said Negroes to his Children and
 their Heirs to be equally divided among them and in default
 of such Children I then give the said Negroes to his Brothers
 and their Heirs to be equally divided among them.
 Impremis I give to my Son Hezekiah Stone the land and plan-
 tation whereon I now live containing by Estimation eight hundred
 Acres to him and his Heirs forever: I also give to my said Son
 Hezekiah all my Stock of Hogs a Horse called Sloop and the
 Stock of Sheep after his Mothers death. I also lend to my said
 Son during his natural life the following Negroes to wit, a
 Woman named Mall a Boy named Junony a Girl named
 Sarah and a fellow named Nembly, and after his decease I
 then give the said Negroes and their increase to his Children and
 their Heirs and in default of such Children I then give the said
 Negroes to his Brothers and their Heirs to be equally divided
 among them. Impremis I give my Son Mabel Stone and
 to his Heirs forever a Negro Girl named Mall and her increase.
 Impremis I lend to my loving Wife Francis Taylor Stone

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UNTIL this Will to be equally divided, I further give unto my
 said Wife all the rest and residue of my Estate not before disposed
 of during her natural life and after her decease I then desire
 the same may be equally divided between all my Sons ex-
 cept Hezekiah, and in case any of my Sons should be dead
 at the time of the division my Will and desire is that my
 Children shall be entitled to such part to be equally divided
 among them. I also further lend to my said Wife ^{during her natural life} two other
 Negroes a Boy named Charles and a Girl named Lucy
 and after her decease to be equally divided among all my Sons
 except my Son Hezekiah. my will and desire is that my
 Estate be not appraised. I do hereby appoint John Ware
 my Son William Stone and Hezekiah Stone Executors of
 this my last Will and Testament avowing all former Wills
 In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and af-
 fixed my Seal this fifth day of September one thousand
 seven hundred and seventy seven.
