Will of Jacob
 Misher
 &c.

In the name of God Amen, I Jacob Misher of the County
 of Franklin, being sick, but of sound mind and memory, do
 make and declare this as my last Will & Testament hereby
 revoking all former Wills by me made. In the first place
 I desire all my just debts shall be paid as soon as possible
 after my decease, and secondly I give and bequeath to my
 Daughter Mary Misher all my Estate both real & personal of
 every description whatsoever, to her and her heirs for ever,
 except one hundred acres of Land, being part of the upper
 end of the Tract of Land I now live on, and bounded as follows
 to wit, Beginning at a white oak near a Branch, thence
 along Ikenburg's line West twenty poles to a Box oak, North
 fifty one West, one hundred and seventy four poles crossing a
 Branch and the road to Pinders on the old line, and with the
 same North Sixty five East, one hundred and twenty eight
 poles to a Box oak, South twenty eight East thirty four
 poles to a small white oak, South eighty two East Sixty
 poles to Pinders on a ridge, thence dividing line South seventeen
 West, one and thirty poles to the Beginning, which I give &
 bequeath unto the children of my Daughter Anna Reed,
 to be equally divided between them, to them and their heirs
 for ever, and it further my Will and desire that Martin
 Reed husband to my Daughter Anna Reed may
 continue and remain on the one hundred acres of Land
 aforesaid, during the natural life of my said Daughter Anna
 Reed, and as long thereafter as she and her children shall live, and if my Daughter Anna Reed
 should die without issue, then the said one hundred acres of Land should remain to my Daughter Anna Reed's

Longest liver. She is to have the above mentioned place during her life time or widowhood, but in case she marries to leave the place immediately; and it is further my Will and desire that the Timber growing on the Land last mentioned shall not be sold, or wantonly destroyed, and I hereby injoin on my Executors that in case unnecessary destruction or sale of the Timber aforesaid should be made, that it may and shall be their duty to remove the said Reed by using all legal methoes from the aforesaid one hundred acres of Land, I hereby appoint Henry Kenbury and Joseph Klinginbeal my Executors of this my last Will and Testament. In Testimony Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this second day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and two.

 This last Will and Testament of Jacob Mishler deceased was proved by the solemn affirmation of Adam Hartzel and the oath of William Greer, two of the witnesses hereto and ordered to be recorded. and on the motion of Henry Kenbury and Joseph Klinginbeal, who solemnly affirmed, agreeable to the forms of their Religion, and as the Law in such cases direct, and together with William Greer and Jacob Ringery their Securities entered into and acknowledged their Bonds in the sum of five hundred dollars conditioned according to Law. Certificate is granted them for obtaining a Probate in due form.
