In the Name of God Amen, I John Divers of Franklin County being weak and low in body, but of sound mind and perfect memory, do constitute this my last Will and Testament, and desire it may be received by all as such, and first I humbly resign my soul to god, who gave it my body to the Earth from whence it was taken in full assurance of its resurrection from thence at the last day, as for my burial I desire it may be decent without Pomp, or State at the discretion of my dear wife & Executors hereafter named, who I doubt not will manage it with all requisite prudence as to my worldly Estate, I desire positively that my just debts shall be paid ^{First} I give to my dear and loving wife during her natural life, or widowhood this house wherein I now dwell, with all the furniture, and the Land, and Tenements that lie about it, also the Stock of Horses, cattle & Hogs after giving the two small boys a Horse a peice, and cattle to make them equal with the rest, also I give her ^{the} three grown negroes Jubeter, Luck, & Peg during her Widowhood, and Luck during her life, then to be equally divided among my four Daughters; The Stock and Household furniture to be equally divided among all my children boys and girls, the Land after her death to fall to my Son Annivius, also the first negro child which shall be born of Luck or Peg. Secondly I give to my Son Christopher Divers, the parcel of Land he now lives on, beginning at Fergusons Old Cross Line, running down the creek, as it meanders to a Poplar on the north side of Gills Creek; below the old ford, thence a straight Line to Hawkens Corner post oak, and with Hawkens Line to Hook's Line, thence with the old Line to the beginning to him and his Heirs for ever. Thirdly I give to my Son Aquilla Divers the Land he now lives on beginning at Hawkens Corner post oak, thence with the old Line to Dillions Pointers then a straight Line to Fergusons Corner white oak, then down the branch to the creek, then up the creek to Bormers Cabbin, then a straight Line to Fergusons Corner white oak, then with the creek down to a Poplar, thence a straight Line to the Beginning, the above described Land I give to him and his Heirs for ever; also a parcel of Land lying on the Big Branch, and both sides of Gills Creek, bounded by the Lines of Dillon, Arrington Ellis, Ferguson, and Aquilla Divers, I leave to be divided between Christopher and Aquilla Divers, in proportion to what either of them gains or loses in the division of the other tract; Fourthly I give to my Daughter Sally Meador one negro girl named Sylvy and her increase for ever, to her & her Heirs; Fifthly I give to my Daughter Elizabeth Booth, one negro boy named Ned, to her and her Heirs for ever; Sixthly I leave to my Daughter Mary Meador, one negro girl named Mully, & her increase to her and her Heirs for ever; Seventhly I leave to my Son, Francis Divers, one

Negro girl; also the tract of Land lying on the Round Hill, beginning at the Turn of the Big Branch, on Arrington's crop Line, running down the Branch to the mouth, thence up the creek to the mouth of the Hay Stack Branch to a Beech, and up ~~the~~ said Branch to the old Line and with it to the Beginning to him and his heirs forever. Eighthly I leave to my Daughter Ellenzer Epperson one negro girl Jenny, & her Increase, to her and her heirs forever, also two cows and calves, one feather Bed and furniture, and fifteen and a half pounds of Pewter. and ninthly I desire if William Robertson serves his time out for which he is bound, he shall ^{then} have a Horse and Saddle, and a suit of Cloaths, and I do hereby appoint my dear and loving Wife Executrix, and my two Sons Christopher and Aquilla Divers ^{Executors} to this my last Will & Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty second day of February in the year of our Lord Eighteen hundred. Sealed, published, & declared by the above named John Divers for & as his last Will and Testament in the presence of us

At a court held for Franklin County at the Courthouse the 7th day of July 1800. This Last Will and Testament of John Divers deceased was produced in Court by Mary Divers the Executrix, and Aquilla Divers & Christopher Divers the Executors herein named, proved by the oath of Amos Ellison, John Forbes, and Richard Booth, the subscribing witnesses, and ordered to be recorded. And at a court held for the said County at the Courthouse the 1st day of December 1800. On the motion of the said Executrix and Executors, who made oath as the Law directs, and together with Abraham Ferguson, and Thomas Fowler their securities executed bonds in the penalty of two thousand pounds - conditioned according to Law, Certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate in due form.
