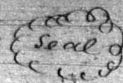
In the name of God amen, I John Doughten of the County of Franklin and State of Virginia being weak in body but of sound mind and disposing memory for which I thank God, and calling to mind the uncertainty of human life and being desirous to dispose of all such worldly Estate as it hath pleased God to bless me with, do hereby make this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form as follows, to wit, 1st I desire after my decease that all my Just debts and funeral Expences be paid by my Executors hereafter named, and after the payments of my Just debts and funeral Expences, I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved wife Grace Doughten her choice of all the household and Kitchen Furniture. It is my desire that all my provisions that I have laid in for the consumption of my family that is now living with me shall have the benefit of the same, also the whole of my stock of Hogs and the crop that shall be made on the plantation that I now live on, shall be for their benefit, that is my wife Grace Doughten and my son John Doughten, & my two Daughters Keziah and Nancy Doughten & no other of my children to have any part of what I have before mentioned, also I give to my son William Doughten six shillings to be paid to him by my Executors, and to have no more of my Estate, Also I give to my Daughter Mary Forsyth six shillings to be paid by my Executors & no more of my Estate, It is my desire that the balance of my Estate which I have not before mentioned shall be sold by my Executors for cash, and Equally divided between my wife Grace Doughten and my several Children which I shall now mention, my sons, Charles & Joseph Doughten, and John Doughten, my Daughter Jane Armstrong, Keziah & Nancy Doughten, It is my desire that my Executors shall have a Wagon finished which I have begun as soon as possible, and that my son John shall have the use of her on the plantation until the sale of my property, the movable property to be sold at public auction, my Lands I desire ^{that} my Executors shall sell at private sale or public sale as they may think best, for the best price that can be had in cash, and the money Equally divided as aforesaid, and Lastly I do constitute and appoint my Sons Joseph and John Doughten my Executors of this my Last Will and Testament Revoking all former Wills or Testaments by me made.
